A Message from the incoming Local Area Commander for Whitehorse:

An overview of the latest 12-month crime statistics for the City of Whitehorse

While crime levels in our municipality have traditionally remained below the Victorian average, the most recent figures show a notable increase that residents should be aware of.

For the year ending March 2025, Whitehorse recorded 5,003.2 criminal incidents per 100,000 residents, compared with 6,692.2 across Victoria. Although still comparatively lower, this represents a 23.2% increase in reported incidents since 2024. When broken down by category, offences against the person in Whitehorse remain lower than both the Eastern Region and the State average. However, offences against property are higher than the Eastern Region, though still below the overall State average.

In 2025, the rate of offences against the person in Whitehorse was 550 per 100,000, compared with 635 in the Eastern Region and 1,369 across Victoria. For property offences, Whitehorse recorded 3,947 per 100,000, compared with 3,442 in the Eastern Region and 5,222 statewide.

The top five recorded offences for Whitehorse were:

- 1. Theft from Motor Vehicle 2,583 incidents
- 37% involved unlocked vehicles
- 38% related to number plate theft
- **2. Theft** 1,097 incidents
 - Petrol, mail (including parcel deliveries), mobile phones, clothing and groceries were the most commonly stolen items
- 3. Theft of Motor Vehicle 1,013 incidents
 - 50% of stolen vehicles were unlocked at the time of the offence
- 4. Shopsteal 754 incidents
 - 240 offenders arrested and interviewed

- 51 were first-time offenders
- 25–34-year-olds represented the largest offender age group
- 5. Burglary 634 incidents
 - 26% of affected properties were left unsecured

Looking After Each Other - Simple Ways to avoid becoming a victim of crime

While many offences occur opportunistically, small habits can make a big difference. The following personalguardianship strategies can help reduce vulnerability and discourage criminal behaviour in the community:

Lock up every time — even briefly – Most vehicle and household thefts involve unlocked doors. Treat quick errands and driveway parking the same as overnight security.

Remove valuables from sight - Phones, wallets, laptops, bags and tradie tools are strong motivators for break-ins. A clean, empty car interior reduces temptation.

Secure number plates and parcels – Anti-theft screws are inexpensive and effective. Where possible, redirect parcels to workplaces, parcel lockers or post office collection points.

Know your neighbours - Exchanging contact details builds awareness and encourages reporting of unusual activity — a proven deterrent to crime.

Light up entrances and maintain sightlines - Motion-sensor lighting, visible front doors and trimmed hedges increase natural surveillance and decrease the appeal for burglars.



Report incidents promptly – Even minor offences help inform police deployment and crime-prevention planning. A safer community is a shared responsibility.

Recent Crime Narratives

from Whitehorse Crime Prevention Officer -Leading Senior Constable Curtis Williams

Please note! These are just a few of the crimes reported in our local areas over the last month.

Theft from Motor Vehicle Mont Albert – The victim's car was parked on the street opposite their address. It was accessed by unknown means and no visible force. The victim's wallet, driver's licence, cash, handbag and sunglasses were stolen. Approximate value \$600.

Theft from Motor Vehicle Burwood East – The victim parked their car in the basement car park at work. CCTV captured an unknown male enter unlocked car stealing the victim's wallet and sunglasses. Approximate value \$500.

Theft of Motor Vehicle Box Hill — The victim was packing up their tools from a building site and left the keys in the ignition of their Toyota Hilux utility. Two unknown males drove past in a black van, with one male exiting and driving off in the victim's vehicle.

Burglary Box Hill North — At approximately 3pm unknown offenders entered via the unlocked front door and stole three watches from a bedroom.

Burglary Blackburn – Entry gained via unlocked rear sliding door. Jewellery stolen.

Burglary Burwood East – Uknown offenders jemmied the front door open and stole jewellery and cash from the master bedroom.

Criminal Damage Burwood East – Two unknown offenders ran up the victim's driveway and kicked the garage door, damaging the door, before running off.

Obtain Financial Advantage by Deception Mont Albert

Phishing Scam: The victim was attempting to sell clothing items on a website. They were contacted by a "buyer" who moved the conversation to WhatsApp. The buyer then supplied false payment details and a link pretending to be from the website with a link for the victim to follow to allow the payment to go through.

The victim supplied their name, address, DOB, driver's licence, bank account numbers, Netbank and credit card numbers. A total of \$1,790 was transferred from the credit card without permission to a crypto currency account.

Theft Box Hill – The victim was selling their laptop via a Social Media platform's marketplace. The victim was persuaded to meet a potential buyer in a playground near the local library. The offender inspected the laptop for 40 minutes before running off with it.

Don't let your Christmas be a "Silly Season"!

Whether you celebrate Christmas, Kwanzaa, Hanukkah or another festive occasion, it can be both happy and stressful in equal measure.



5 ways to have a safe, stress-free festive season –put the happy into "Happy Holidays"

1. Be scam-aware when shopping online:

- Remember all the tips! If it sounds too good to be true, it usually is!
- **2. Keep pressies out of sight.** When shopping, keep your purchases safely out of sight in the boot. And when you put your gifts under the tree, make sure they can't be seen from outside through a window.
- **3.** Cut up boxes and packaging. Don't let empty boxes advertise to opportunistic thieves all the shiny new things you have in your home. Dont neglect to mark/engrave them for Identification purposes in case they are stolen!
- **4. Don't leave your door unlocked for Santa!** He is magical and can put presents under your tree without ever needing a chimney, or a window or door left unlocked for him. Reduce your chance of being one of the one-infive burglaries which occur through an unlocked door or window!
- 5. Let's Watch out for each other: Christmas and New Year usually means the party season is in full swing! When heading out for the night, stay safe,



plan ahead, stick with your friends, drink wisely, be alert for spiking, and arrange safe transport home. If partying at home, send out personal invites, don't post it on social media! And, if a big one, Register it with your local Police! More tips at www.nhw.com.au/partysafe

Wondering what gifts to buy?

Why not think about a security system, (but dont forget to register it with your local Police!) sensor lights, OBD lock for that new car, a car alarm, a steering wheel lock, (still a good visible deterrent!) or a FARADAY pouch, to keep your keys and cards safe from remote scanning.
