### **Recent Crime Narratives**

### from Whitehorse Crime Prevention Officer - Ldg Snr Const Curtis Williams

These crimes were reported over a 7 day period mid -May!

Theft of Motor Vehicle Box Hill South The victim left their car keys unattended while at the gym. The keys were used to steal the victim's Toyota Corolla from the car park.

**Theft of Motor Vehicle Nunawading** The victim's Toyota 86 was parked on the street overnight. Came out the next morning to find broken glass on the ground and the car missing.

Theft of Motor Vehicle Mitcham The victim's Toyota Land Cruiser was parked on the street overnight. It is not known how access was gained as the victim has the keys and there are no signs of forced entry.

**Criminal Damage Blackburn North** The rear passenger window of the victim vehicle was smash during the night. The victim's neighbour and several other vehicles nearby were also damage.

Criminal Damage by Fire Box Hill A male ripped the security camera to a business off the wall. The male lit items on fire and held them to the back door of the business. The male has been identified and is yet to be spoken to by Police.

**Burglary Mitcham** Two youths wearing school uniforms were captured on CCTV entering a multi-business premises using a piece of wire to actuate the internal door handle of locked door into the lobby. They access the fire control cabinets and rummage around before leaving empty handed.

**Burglary Mont Albert** Unknown offenders forced entry through the back door of the victim's house. It does not appear that anything was stolen.

Burglary Box Hill North The offender entered an open garage and stole the victim's e-scooter worth \$6899.

**Storage Cage Burglary Burwood East** The victim's storage cage was repeatedly broken into over a two-month period. The victim did not realise until the end of that period. Several suitcases worth \$5000 were stolen.

Threats to inflict injury Box Hill The victim sub-let a room in his home to the offender. After some behavioural issues the victim asked the offender to find alternate accommodation. The offender picked up a knife and threated to put holes in the victim.

Carjacking Burwood East The victim was sitting in their car for approximately 30 mins when an unknown vehicle drove up next to him. Unknown offenders smashed the victim's window and pulled them from the car. The victim received a laceration from a knife that was produced during the incident.

Assault Vermont South The offender, aged in their 20's, attempted to steal from Coles and was confronted by staff. The offender punched one the of the staff members in the face before leaving on foot without the items.

Assault Box Hill The victim was walking alone to the shops to purchase food for dinner. The victim was approached by four youths. One of the youths shaped up to the victim, who shaped up against the youth. A second youth produced a large knife and swung it at the victim who received a cut to their finger. The youths fled on foot prior to Police arriving.

Aggravated Burglary Blackburn South Unknown offender gained entry via the back door. The victim was initially asleep but woke up when the offender fell down the stairs before leaving the address. A passport and car keys were stolen.

Robbery Box Hill The victim was heading home from school when they were approached by an unknown youth who was part of a nearby group in their late teens. The youth threated to punch the victim if they didn't handover their air pods. The victim complied. Police used tracking on the devices to locate the group travelling on a bus. Three were arrested at the scene and the victim's air pods recovered.

### What to consider when installing CCTV.

- Cover all entry and exit points, your driveway and the street in front of your house.
- ✓ Ensure CCTV cameras only cover your property.
- ✓ Avoid angles that capture your neighbours' property.
- ✓ Make CCTV cameras visible. Do not use fake cameras.
- Securely attach the camera or video-doorbell to the house.
- Ensure the system has adequate storage space.
- ✓ Understand the security settings for your network.
- Ensure the storage system is well hidden, secured and backed up off site.
- Consider the image quality during the day and at night.
   For offenders to be identified, images need to be clear.
- Pair CCTV with sensor lights and alarms to maximise protection.
- ✓ Look for systems which send alerts to your mobile phone.


